21 **DISCIPLINARY PROCEEDINGS**

22 Mr. Jones presented Ms. Aikens as the Board's new legal counsel.

1 Mr. James Spafford was recused from discussion on Tabs 1 – 3 due to participation on the
2 Probable Cause Panel. Ms. Tameka German presided over these proceedings in his stead.

3 **SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT**

4 **TAB 1 Robyn Joy Laub, OT8386, DOH Case # 2021-08575 File # 7061,**
5 **(PCP Johnson & Spafford)**

6 Ms. Laub was present on the call and not represented by legal counsel. Ms. Laub was sworn in
7 by the court reporter.

8 Ms. Laub’s case was before the Board for alleged violations of Section 468.217(1)(I), F.S.
9 (2018) of failing to keep written records justifying the course of treatment of the patient,
10 including, but not limited to, patient histories, examination results, and test results.

11 Mr. Den Beste, Prosecuting Attorney, presented the case, and a proposed Settlement
12 Agreement to the Board, which included the following terms:

- 13 • Letter of Concern
- 14 • \$500 fine payable within 2 years, \$250 due each year and the remainder due within the
15 last year
- 16 • \$3,000 costs payable within 2 years, \$1,500 due each year and the remainder due within
17 the last year; and
- 18 • 8 hours of CE on Medical Documentation and Record-Keeping within 90 days

19 **MOTION:** Following discussion, Ms. German moved to accept the proposed Settlement
20 Agreement. Dr. Banta seconded the motion, which carried 3/0.

21 **TAB 2 Deirdre Laborde, OTA13918, DOH Case # 2019-46415, File # 6766,**
22 **(PCP Johnson & Spafford)**

23 Ms. Laborde was present on the call and represented by legal counsel, Ricky Strong, Esquire.
24 Ms. Laborde was sworn in by the court reporter.

25 Ms. Laborde’s case was before the Board for an alleged violation of Section 468.217(1)(I),
26 Florida Statutes (2019), for making deceptive, untrue, or fraudulent representations in the
27 practice of occupational therapy.

28 Mr. Den Beste, Prosecuting Attorney, presented the case, and a proposed Settlement
29 Agreement to the Board, which included the following terms:

- 30 • Suspension of license for 1 year;
- 31 • \$5,000 costs payable within 3 years, \$1,500 due each year and the remainder due within
32 the last year; and
- 33 • 15 hours of CE on Laws and Rules and Ethics within 90 days

34 **MOTION:** Following discussion, Ms. German moved to accept the proposed Settlement
35 Agreement. Dr. Banta seconded the motion, which carried 3/0.

36 **HEARING NOT INVOLVING DISPUTED ISSUES OF MATERIAL FACT**

1 **TAB 3 Larry D. Jackson, OTA13963, DOH Case # 2019-26842, File # 7072,**
2 **(PCP Johnson & Spafford)**

3 Mr. Jackson was present on the call and not represented by legal counsel. Mr. Jackson was
4 sworn in by the court reporter.

5 Mr. Jackson's case was before the Board for an alleged violation of Section 468.217(1)(l),
6 Florida Statutes (2018), for making deceptive, untrue, or fraudulent representations in the
7 practice of occupational therapy.

8 Mr. Den Beste, presented and summarized the case presented as a Hearing Not Involving
9 Disputed Issues of Material Fact.

10 Disciplinary Guidelines:

11 Rule 64B11-4.003(4)(1), Florida Administrative Code, (2018) provides the following disciplinary
12 guidelines for an initial offense of section 468.217(1)(l), Florida Statutes (2018): from 1 year
13 probation and a \$10,000 fine up to 1 year suspension and 1 year probation with conditions and
14 a \$10,000 fine.

15 Mr. Den Beste, Prosecuting Attorney, presented the case, and proposed penalties to the Board,
16 which included the following terms:

- 17 • \$1,000 fine payable within 2 years; and
18 • 6 hours of Continuing Education in Laws & Rules within 90 days

19 Mr. Den Beste, cited Rule 64B11-4.003(a), (d) and (e), F.A.C., as mitigating factors to deviate
20 from the disciplinary guidelines.

21 Mr. Den Beste, Prosecuting Attorney, presented to the Board the cost assessment which
22 included the following:

- 23 • \$3,059.81 costs to be paid within 2 years, \$1,500 due each year and the remainder due
24 within the last year

25 **MOTION:** Ms. German moved to accept the investigative report into evidence and find that the
26 Respondent was properly served and does not dispute the issues of material fact set forth in the
27 AC. The motion was seconded by Dr. Banta and carried 3/0.

28 **MOTION:** Ms. German made a motion to adopt the findings of fact and conclusions of Law as
29 set forth in the Administrative Complaint and that this constitutes a violation of the Florida
30 Statutes, as set forth in the Administrative Complaint. The motion was seconded by Ms. Vizvary
31 and carried 3/0.

32 **MOTION:** After discussion, Ms. German made a motion to impose the stated penalties. The
33 motion was seconded by Ms. Vizvary and carried 3/0.

34 **MOTION:** Ms. German made a motion to accept the departments motion to assess costs as
35 stated in the record. The motion was seconded by Dr. Banta and carried 3/0.

8 **RULES REVIEW AND DEVELOPMENT**

9 **TAB 8 Rule 64B11-4.001, F.A.C., Use of Prescription Devices**

10 During the May 2022 meeting, Board staff requested review of this rule in light of
11 correspondence received regarding the lack of availability of prescription device certification
12 courses as well as concerns regarding the training requirements. Following discussion, the
13 Board approved the following language:

14 Didactic *or performance training* may be in person or from interactive, real-time courses. An
15 interactive, real-time course may be a web-based, satellite transmitted, ~~telephone~~ or video
16 conference, or online instruction program that allows or requires the licensee to interact in real
17 time, including live chat, with the instructor during the presentation of the program ~~or in a~~
18 question and answer session upon completion of the program.

19 Upon further reflection on this language after the Board meeting, it appeared there might have
20 been an unintended error in that this language allows for *performance training* to be conducted
21 other than in-person, which appears to be in conflict with Paragraphs (1)(d), (2)(d) and (3)(d) of
22 the rule.

23 Based on the Board's discussion, it appeared the intent was only to allow the *didactic* portion of
24 the training to be made available in an online, interactive, real-time format. If that is the case,
25 the Board is asked to consider approving the following amended proposed rule language:

26 **64B11-4.001 Use of Prescription Devices.**

27 (1) Electrical Stimulation Device.

28 (a) Use of an electrical stimulation device for which a prescription is required by Federal law, 21 C.F.R. §801.109,
29 is expressly prohibited by section 468.203(4), F.S., except by an occupational therapist or an occupational therapy
30 assistant who has received training as prescribed in this rule.

31 (b) For purposes of this rule, an "electrical stimulation device" is any device for which a prescription is required
32 which employs transcutaneous electric current (direct, alternating, or pulsatile) for therapeutic purposes.

33 (c) The training required for students, postgraduates, and licensees to qualify for the use of an electrical
34 stimulation device shall include didactic training of at least four (4) hours and performance of at least five (5)
35 treatments under supervision. The required training may be obtained through educational programs, workshops, or
36 seminars offered at a college or university approved for training of occupational therapists by the American
37 Occupational Therapy Association or of physical therapists by the American Physical Therapy Association or at
38 clinical facilities affiliated with such accredited colleges or universities or through educational programs offered by
39 the American Society of Hand Therapists or Florida Occupational Therapy Association. ~~Online courses are not~~

1 ~~approved for the didactic or performance training.~~ Didactic or performance training may be in person or from
2 interactive, real-time courses. An interactive, real-time course may be a web-based, satellite transmitted, telephone or
3 video conference, or online instruction program that allows or requires the licensee to interact in real time, including
4 live chat, with the instructor during the presentation of the program or in a question and answer session upon
5 completion of the program.

6 (d) Supervised treatment sessions shall be conducted under the personal supervision of licensed occupational
7 therapists and occupational therapy assistants who have completed four hours of coursework in the use of electrical
8 stimulation devices and five (5) supervised treatments or licensed physical therapists and physical therapist assistants
9 trained in the use of electrical stimulation devices. Treatment supervisors must have a minimum of 24 months prior
10 experience in the use of electrical stimulation devices. Personal supervision means that the supervisor is in the room
11 with the trainees and actively provides guidance and supervision of the performance treatments.

12 (e) The training provided which teaches the therapeutic uses of electrical stimulation devices shall provide for the
13 following minimum competency level:

14 1. Standards.

15 a. The expected outcome of treatments with Therapeutic Electrical Current (hereinafter T.E.C.) must be consistent
16 with the goals of treatment.

17 b. Treatment with T.E.C. must be safe, administered to the correct area, and be of proper dosage.

18 c. Treatment with T.E.C. must be adequately documented.

19 2. Current Duration and Mode.

20 a. Ability to determine the duration and mode of current appropriate to the patient's neurophysiological status
21 while understanding Ohm's Law of electricity, physical laws related to the passage of current through various media,
22 as well as impedance.

23 b. Ability to describe normal electrophysiology of nerve and muscle; understanding generation of bioelectrical
24 signals in nerve and muscle; recruitment of motor units in normal muscle and in response to a variety of external
25 stimuli.

26 c. Ability to describe normal and abnormal tissue responses to external electrical stimuli while understanding the
27 differing responses to varieties of current duration, frequency and intensity of stimulation.

28 3. Selection of Method and Equipment.

29 a. Ability to identify equipment with the capability of producing the preselected duration and mode.

30 b. Ability to describe characteristics of electrotherapeutic equipment and understanding the therapeutic value of
31 different electrotherapeutic equipment.

32 c. Ability to describe safety regulations governing the use of electrotherapeutic equipment.

33 d. Ability to describe principles of electrical currents.

34 e. Ability to describe requirements/idiosyncrasies of body areas and pathological conditions with respect to
35 electrotherapeutic treatment.

36 4. Preparation of Treatment.

37 Ability to prepare the patient for treatment through positioning and adequate instructions.

38 5. Treatment Administration.

39 a. Ability to correctly operate equipment and appropriately adjust the intensity and current while understanding
40 rate of stimulation, identification of motor points, and physiological effects desired.

41 b. Ability to adjust the intensity and rate to achieve the optimal response, based on the pertinent evaluative data.

42 6. Documentation of Treatments.

43 Ability to document treatment including immediate and long-term effects of therapeutic electrical current.

44 (f) Any occupational therapist or occupational therapy assistant who uses such electrical stimulation device shall,
45 upon request of the Board, or the Department, present proof that he or she has obtained the training required by this
46 rule.

47 (2) Ultrasound Device.

48 (a) Use of an ultrasound device for which a prescription is required by Federal law, 21 C.F.R. §801.109, is
49 expressly prohibited by section 468.203(4), F.S., except by an occupational therapist or occupational therapy assistant

1 who has received training as prescribed in this rule.

2 (b) For purposes of this rule, an “ultrasound device” is any device intended to generate and emit ultrasonic
3 radiation for therapeutic purposes at ultrasonic frequencies above 100 kilohertz (kHz).

4 (c) The training required for students, postgraduates, and licensees to qualify for the use of an ultrasonic
5 stimulation device shall include didactic training of at least four (4) hours and performance of at least five (5)
6 treatments under supervision. The required training may be obtained through educational programs, workshops, or
7 seminars offered at a college or university approved for training of occupational therapists by the American
8 Occupational Therapy Association or of physical therapists by the American Physical Therapy Association or at
9 clinical facilities affiliated with such accredited colleges or universities or educational programs offered through the
10 American Society of Hand Therapists or Florida Occupational Therapy Association. ~~Online courses are not approved~~
11 ~~for the didactic or performance training.~~ Didactic or performance training may be in person or from interactive, real-
12 time courses. An interactive, real-time course may be a web-based, satellite transmitted, telephone or video
13 conference, or online instruction program that allows or requires the licensee to interact in real time, including live
14 chat, with the instructor during the presentation of the program or in a question and answer session upon completion
15 of the program.

16 (d) Supervised treatment sessions shall be conducted under the personal supervision of licensed occupational
17 therapists and occupational therapy assistants who have completed four hours of coursework in the use of ultrasound
18 devices and five (5) supervised treatments or licensed physical therapists and physical therapist assistants trained in
19 the use of ultrasound devices. Treatment supervisors must have a minimum of 24 months prior experience in the use
20 of ultrasound devices. Personal supervision means that the supervisor is in the room with the trainees and actively
21 provides guidance and supervision of the performance treatments.

22 (e) The training provided which teaches the therapeutic uses of ultrasound devices shall provide for the following
23 minimum competency level:

24 1. Standards.

- 25 a. The expected outcome of treatment with ultrasound must be consistent with the goals of treatment.
26 b. Treatment with ultrasound must be safely administered to the correct area, and be of proper dosage.
27 c. Treatment with ultrasound must be adequately documented.

28 2. Instrumentation.

29 a. Ability to describe the physiological effects of pulsed versus continuous modes as well as differentiate tissue
30 responses to the modes of application.

31 b. Ability to describe ultrasound absorption characteristics of various body tissues and identify sources and causes
32 of excessive absorption in normal versus abnormal tissue.

33 c. Ability to determine the medium to be used and the temperature of that medium.

34 d. Ability to select the appropriate sound head size and contour considering the area and condition being treated.

35 e. Ability to describe equipment characteristics, indications and contraindications for treatment, including
36 identifying source and mechanisms of generation of ultrasound energy and its transmission through air and physical
37 matter.

38 3. Preparation for Treatment. Ability to prepare the patient for treatment through positioning and adequate
39 instruction.

40 4. Determination of Dosage. Ability to determine dosage through determination of target depth, chronicity versus
41 acuteness of the condition, and application of power/dosage calculation rules.

42 5. Treatment Administration. Ability to administer treatment through identification of controls, sequence of
43 operation, correct sound head application techniques and application of all safety rules and precautions.

44 6. Documentation of Treatment. Ability to document treatment, including immediate and long-term effects of
45 clinical ultrasound.

46 (f) Any occupational therapist or occupational therapy assistant who uses such ultrasound device shall, upon
47 request of the Board, or the Department, present proof that he or she has obtained the training required by this rule.

48 (3) Neurofeedback Device.

1 (a) Use of a neurofeedback device for which a prescription is required by Federal law, 21 C.F.R. §801.109, is
2 expressly prohibited by Section 468.203(4), F.S., except by an occupational therapist or occupational therapy assistant
3 who has received training as prescribed in this rule.

4 (b) For purposes of this rule, a “neurofeedback device” is any device that provides immediate feedback from a
5 computer-based program that measures brainwave activity with the use of sound, visual and/or tactile input to cue the
6 brain to reorganize and retrain itself.

7 (c) The training required for students, postgraduates, and licensees to qualify for the use of a neurofeedback device
8 shall include didactic training of at least sixteen (16) hours and performance of at least five (5) treatments under
9 supervision. The required training may be obtained through educational programs, workshops, or seminars offered at
10 a college or university approved for training of occupational therapists by the American Occupational Therapy
11 Association or of physical therapists by the American Physical Therapy Association or at clinical facilities affiliated
12 with such accredited colleges or universities or educational programs offered through the American Society of Hand
13 Therapists or Florida Occupational Therapy Association. ~~Online courses are not approved for the didactic or~~
14 ~~performance training. Didactic or performance training may be in person or from interactive, real-time courses. An~~
15 ~~interactive, real-time course may be a web-based, satellite transmitted, telephone or video conference, or online~~
16 ~~instruction program that allows or requires the licensee to interact in real time, including live chat, with the instructor~~
17 ~~during the presentation of the program or in a question and answer session upon completion of the program.~~

18 (d) Supervised treatment sessions shall be conducted under the personal supervision of licensed occupational
19 therapists and occupational therapy assistants who have completed sixteen (16) hours of coursework in the use of
20 neurofeedback devices and five (5) supervised treatments, licensed physical therapists and physical therapist assistants
21 who have completed sixteen(16) hours of coursework in the use of neurofeedback devices and five (5) supervised
22 treatments, medical doctors trained in the use of neurofeedback devices, psychologists trained in the use of
23 neurofeedback devices, or other licensed healthcare professionals trained in the use of neurofeedback devices.
24 Treatment supervisors must have a minimum of 24 months prior experience in the use of neurofeedback devices.
25 Personal supervision means that the supervisor is in the room with the trainees and actively provides guidance and
26 supervision of the performance treatments.

27 (e) The training provided which teaches the therapeutic uses of neurofeedback devices shall provide for the
28 following minimum competency level:

29 1. Standards.

30 a. The expected outcome of training with neurofeedback devices must be consistent with the goals of treatment.

31 b. Training with neurofeedback devices must be safely administered to the scalp.

32 c. Training with neurofeedback devices must be adequately documented.

33 2. Instrumentation.

34 a. Ability to describe core concepts, methods, and instrumentation of neurofeedback.

35 b. Ability to interpret the EEG (electroencephalogram) with respect to signal integrity and the presence of
36 artifacts.

37 c. Ability to understand and describe concepts of frequency and amplitude.

38 d. Ability to create, adjust and adapt training protocols based on the EEG, clinical observation, and response to
39 training.

40 e. Ability to describe equipment characteristics, indications and contraindications for training.

41 3. Preparation for Training. Ability to prepare the patient for training through positioning and adequate instruction.

42 4. Determination of training duration and intensity.

43 a. Ability to discern when a trainee exhibits limited tolerance for an extended training session.

44 b. Ability to judge the pacing of training sessions based on tolerance and response to the training session.

45 5. Training Administration. Ability to administer neurofeedback training through identification of controls,
46 sequence of operation, and application of all safety rules and precautions.

47 6. Documentation of Neurofeedback Training. Ability to document training, including immediate and long-term
48 effects of clinical neurofeedback training.

1 (f) Any occupational therapist or occupational therapy assistant who uses such neurofeedback device shall, upon
 2 request of the Board, or the Department, present proof that he or she has obtained the training required by this rule.

 9 \$200,000 within one year after the implementation of the rule, 2) that the proposed amendments
 10 should not be designated as a minor violation, and 3) there should not be a sunset provision.
 11 Ms. Vizvary seconded the motion, which carried 4/0.
